As the largest supplier of catastrophe reinsurance to the U.S., he will outline this and other important links with the U.S., as well as Bermuda's key role as a global leader in the financial services market.

He will also outline investments providing the highest return for disaster mitigation and ways in which the NAIC is leading education efforts, including the role of insurance in resiliency and rebuilding.

She will discuss the <i>OneNYC</i> resiliency program being implemented to prepare the city's neighborhoods, economy and public services to withstand and emerge stronger from the impacts of climate change and present ways the insurance industry can bolster efforts.
